Proposed New Rates

The Board of Directors set a public hearing for June 18, 2025, at 7:00 pm ("Regular Board Meeting"). The Board Meeting will be held at the District Office located at 8930 Placer Road, Redding, CA. Please refer to the posted agenda for the most current meeting information. At the public hearing, the proposed rate increases will be presented and the public will be given an opportunity to comment. If adopted, the proposed changes will become effective July 1, 2025.

The following is a summary of the recommended adjustments:

- * A \$ 0.50 rate increase is proposed to both the current Base Rate and Water Availability Charge (WAC).
- * A \$2.00 rate increase is proposed to the Zone A Base Rate Surcharge.
- * A \$2.00 rate increase is proposed to the Zone A1 Base Rate Surcharge.

Tank A1 Renovation Complete





Superior Tank Solutions began the renovation on April 3, 2025, and finished on May 1, 2025. The renovation included installing a new AWWA compliant 30" mushroom vent with a compliant non-corrodible mesh screen to meet EPA and AWWA standards., as well as installed an OSHA compliant roof railing at the roof hatch. They also provided and installed OSHA compliant tie off points on the tank roof next to vents and all hatches.

The inside of the tank was sand blasted, then applied with an ANSI/NSF 61 approved epoxy coating, as well as an epoxy stripe coat on welds, edges, sharp corners, and irregular surfaces,. Once all coating was complete the tank was cleaned, sanitized and tested prior to filling with water.

The outside of the tank was pressure washed, primed and painted.

During this project, Zone A1 was never out of water. Thank you to our field staff and Superior Tank Solutions for making this renovation a seamless endeavor.



It's Not to Late to Plant Your Summer Garden

Water Wisely: Adequate hydration is crucial for plants during the summer heat. Water your garden deeply and thoroughly, preferably in the early morning or late evening to minimize evaporation. Focus on the roots, as surface watering can encourage shallow root systems. Apply a generous layer of mulch around your plants, leaving space around the stems to prevent rot. The mulch will enrich the soil as it decomposes, providing essential nutrients to your plants.

Provide Shade: Just like us, plants can suffer from sunburn and heat stress. Shield sensitive crops and delicate flowers from the harsh midday sun by providing temporary shade. Use shade cloth, row covers, or even strategically placed umbrellas to protect your plants during the hottest part of the day.

Select Heat-Tolerant Varieties: Choose plant varieties that are well-suited to hot weather conditions. Look for heat-tolerant vegetables like tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, carrots and beets, as well as drought-resistant herbs such as rosemary and thyme.

These resilient plants are better equipped to withstand the rigors of summer heat and require less maintenance, allowing you to enjoy a bountiful harvest with minimal effort.

Practice Regular Maintenance: Stay vigilant with your garden maintenance routine throughout the summer months. Monitor soil moisture levels regularly and adjust your watering schedule as needed. Remove weeds promptly to prevent competition for resources and reduce the risk of pests and diseases.
