

# Where Does our Water Come From?

Did you know that the water in Whiskeytown comes from Trinity?

Headwaters of the Trinity River originate deep within the remote and rugged Trinity Alps. The Trinity Alps watershed generates an average annual water runoff of about 1,250,000 acre-feet.

Trinity Lake feeds into Lewiston Lake through the Trinity Dam which regulates flows on the Trinity River. Trinity Lake has a storage capacity of 2,448,000 acre-feet, which is half the size of Shasta Lake.

Lewiston Lake which holds 14,660 acre-feet flows water down the Trinity River through the Lewiston Dam and diverts water to Whiskeytown Lake by means of the Clear Creek Tunnel. The Clear Creek Tunnel is 17.5 feet in diameter and 10.7 miles long.

Whiskeytown Lake holds 241,100 acre-feet of water. Each year the District uses approximately 1,500 to 1,900 acre-feet from Whiskeytown Lake.

The Bureau of Reclamation manages the water in each of the reservoirs to allow for fisheries, recreation, power, consumption, protecting ecosystems and flood control.
